Strategic Plan Renewal

Dr. Gusick presented the Tredyffrin/Easttown School District Strategic Plan. Since 1996, the District has engaged in a six-year strategic planning cycle. The current strategic plan, effective 2008-2014, involved input from over 900 community stakeholders. The plan has been reviewed annually by the District Strategic Planning Committee. As recommended by the Strategic Planning Committee, the attached plan renews the existing strategic plan for six additional years. The plan renewal carries forth the District mission statement. The strategies, result statements, and action plans have been revised and updated by the Strategic Planning Committee for Board consideration. This plan was approved by the Education Committee and recommend to the full Board for approval at its May 13, 2014 meeting.

The District's induction model includes a mentor teacher who supports the new teacher but does not formally observe the new teacher. Observations are conducted by principals and supervisors. Data is collected and reviewed but not submitted in the form of an inductee portfolio.

Teachers who experience difficulty in reaching students through the traditional linguistic or logical ways of instruction can present materials in other ways to promote learning. Based on the work of Carol Ann Tomlinson, teachers endeavor to differentiate classroom instruction with students' varying abilities in mind. They proactively use multiple approaches to decide what students need to learn, how they'll learn it and how it will be assessed. Differentiated Instruction emerged as a need in response to the increasing diversity of classrooms and to the understanding that students learn differently because of gender, experience, readiness and interests, among other factors. The implications of this research can be applied to curricular areas to meet the needs of diverse learners.

Consent VII, E, 3: Tax Bill Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion

FROM: Arthur J. McDonnell, Business Manager/Board Secretary

Action Under Consideration: That the Board of School Directors for the Tredyffrin/Easttown School District adopts the following resolutions which pertains to the approval of the Tax Bill Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion for the 2014 – 2015 fiscal year:

WHEREAS, the County Assessor has certified to the School District that there are 11,662 approved homestead properties in the School District and 3 approved farmstead properties in the school district for the 2014 – 2015 fiscal year; and,

WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania Department of Education has certified that the School District's Property Tax Reduction Allocation for the 2014 – 2015 fiscal year is \$2,099,989.65.

In accordance with the Special Session Act 1 of 2006, known as the Taxpayer Relief Act, the Board of School Directors hereby establishes the following homestead/farmstead exclusion for the 2014 - 2015 fiscal year:

- 1. All approved homesteads and/or farmsteads shall receive a homestead/farmstead exclusion of \$8,904.00 of the assessed value of the homestead and/or farmstead, which, based upon the millage rate established for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, corresponds to a tax reduction of \$180.01.
- 2. The annual property tax bill for each approved homestead and/or farmstead shall include the following information with respect to the homestead/farmstead exclusion: (a) the assessed value, (b) the tax liability on the assessed value, (c) the amount of the homestead/farmstead exclusion in assessed value, (d) the actual tax liability after the homestead/farmstead exclusion and (e) the actual tax savings associated with the homestead/ farmstead exclusion.
- 3. The following notice shall also be included with the annual property tax bills of all owners of approved homestead and/or farmstead properties:

NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

Your enclosed tax bill includes a tax reduction for your homestead and/or farmstead property. As an eligible homestead and/or farmstead property owner, you have received tax relief through a homestead and/or farmstead exclusion which has been provided under the Pennsylvania Taxpayer Relief Act, a law passed by the Pennsylvania General Assembly designed to reduce your property taxes.

These provisions shall apply to the annual property tax bills issued in July 2014 and not to any interim real estate tax bill.

Thereafter, the term of your appointment shall automatically renew for five year renewal periods on each July 1, beginning on July 1, 2019, unless a notice of termination is provided by either party at least 180 days prior to the last day of the current term. A renewal period may be shortened or lengthened upon our mutual agreement. In the event of an unsatisfactory evaluation issued within 60 days before or after the expiration of a renewal term, the Board may elect to terminate your employment upon 180 days notice to you. At all times, during the initial term of appointment and any renewal terms, you are

subject to termination for cause pursuant to and under the procedures stated in Section 1089 of the Public School Code of 1949, as amended.

6) Compensation:

- 7) Base Compensation: Your annual compensation starting on July 1, 2014, will be One Hundred Eighty-five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000), less necessary taxes and withholdings, paid bi-weekly. Changes to base compensation will be reviewed at least annually, commensurate with similarly-situated leaders of the District and based upon market conditions for positions of similar scope and upon your performance. This review may also include, at the discretion of the Board, consideration of assumption of additional duties. Employee Benefits:
 - a) You shall receive all fringe benefits referred to as "Administrator Benefits" contained in the District's Administrator Compensation Plan ("the ACP") in effect during the term of this Agreement including any revisions to the plan adopted during the term of this Agreement ("the then current ACP") to the extent that such benefit is not inconsistent with any benefit specifically provided for in this Agreement. In the case of any conflict, the benefit specifically provided for in this Agreement shall govern.
 - b) As noted above, you shall receive the sick leave benefit set forth in the ACP or, if applicable, the then current ACP.
 - c) District agrees to pay for conferences and individual (as distinguished from District memberships) membership in professional associations directly related to your position; however, the total amount spent per year for conferences and membership dues shall not exceed the budget, and shall be subject to the approval of the Superintendent.
 - d) Please be advised that the District reserves the right to amend, modify or rescind the ACP or, if applicable, the then current ACP at any time at its sole discretion to the extent permitted by law.
- 8) Professional Liability Protection: The Board agrees to provide legal counsel and indemnify you against all uninsured financial loss arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of alleged negligence or other conduct resulting in bodily injury or other injury to any person or damage to the property of any person committed while you are acting within the scope of your employment or under the direction of the Board.

- 9) <u>Disclosure:</u> The Board strongly believes that its employees should not join or continue involvement with the District if they have, or fail to reveal, any conflicts of interest. Therefore, if you accept this new employment agreement, you agree that you are not aware of any actual or potential conflict of interest between the District, its employees, officers, trustees and you in your role as Business Manager, TESD. If you have any business relationships that represent a potential conflict of interest, please disclose them to me prior to accepting this new employment agreement. Further, by accepting this offer, you agree to clear with the Superintendent of Schools, TESD, and any prospective consulting arrangements you would like to perform outside of your employment at the District.
 - a) In addition, you have represented to the Board that you have not been convicted of any crime and that you have not been disciplined by any professional society or licensing body. You have also represented to the Board that you have disclosed any instances in which you have been personally involved -- in connection with the practice of your profession or responsibilities related to your employment -- in any investigation by law enforcement officials, other government agencies, or professional or licensing bodies into allegations of criminal misconduct or violations of professional standards. If, at any time following your acceptance of this offer throughout the course of your employment with the District, you become aware that you are involved in any such investigation, you agree to disclose that fact to the Superintendent of Schools, TESD immediately.
 - b) You may undertake consultative work, speaking engagements, writing, lecturing or other professional duties and obligations provided that engaging in such activities does not materially interfere with your duties as Business Manager, TESD, and with the express written consent of the Superintendent, TESD. In the course of any writing, speaking teaching or other outside work, you shall not represent your views as the views of the Board or the District, or any of its employees, without express written consent of the Superintendent.
- 10) Proprietary/Confidentiality Information and Nondisclosure: You acknowledge a duty of confidentiality owed to the District. You shall not, nor shall any corporation, partnership, or other business entity or person owned or controlled by you, directly or indirectly, at any time during or after your employment by the District, disclose or make accessible to anyone, use, or retain in writing or any other medium, without the express authorization of the District, any Confidential or Proprietary Information of the District. You hereby acknowledge that the Confidential or Proprietary Information is the property of the District, that you shall not duplicate or make use of any such Confidential or Proprietary Information other than in pursuit of the District's activities, and that, upon termination of employment for any reason, you shall deliver to the District, without further demand, all copies thereof, in any medium whatsoever, which are then in your possession. For purposes of this Agreement, Confidential or Proprietary Information shall mean all types of proprietary data and confidential information of the District, which is not legitimately in the public domain, including, but not limited to, all compensation or financial information, student lists, employee files, bid documents, contract forms and other books, records or files relating to the District's business.

11) General Provisions

- a) This Agreement and all appendices, addenda, and amendments made part thereof shall be binding upon the Board and the School District and upon their successor Boards.
- b) If any provision of this Agreement be declared illegal by final decision of a court of this Commonwealth, said provision shall be deemed deleted from this Agreement and the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect if not otherwise affected by said deletion.
- c) The provisions of this Agreement and its appendices may not be changed or supplemented except by written amendment that has been agreed to and signed by both parties.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING KEYSTONE EXAMS AS GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS TREDYFFRIN/EASTTOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT JUNE 16, 2014

WHEREAS, the Tredyffrin/Easttown School District provides meaningful academic instruction and assessment that engages students as critical and creative thinkers and successfully prepares these students for college and careers; and

WHEREAS, the District continues to oppose the State mandate for all Pennsylvania schools to use Keystone Exams as graduation requirements; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1382 eliminates the State requirement for proficient assessment results as a requirement of eligibility for high school graduation; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1382 promotes local control for Districts to decide the weight of State assessments for determining student grades, eligibility for a diploma, and whether or not to require supplemental instruction for nonproficient students; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 1382 limits the cycle of remediation, retesting and project-based assessments to enable all students to maximize their academic choices in high school; and

WHEREAS, the financial savings from the elimination of the current cycle of testing and remediation may be used by local Districts to prevent the elimination of other valued programs.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of School Directors of the Tredyffrin/Easttown School District urges all Senators to support Senate Bill 1382 and all Representatives to support similar legislation that may come to the floor of the House.

Communications with the School Board

Written Correspondence

All written correspondence <u>from identified correspondents, including e-mail</u> <u>eommunications</u>, to the Board <u>including e-mail communications</u>, shall be promptly acknowledged. Responses to questions or further explanations will be provided by the appropriate Administrator or Board member. Responses will be in accordance with other Board Policies. Correspondence received anonymously by the District, by the Board or by its members will not be recognized as formal correspondence and therefore will typically not be given a response.

In accordance with privacy law, all correspondence that is addressed to the School Board will be reviewed by the administration to redact any specifically protected student and/or teacher names.

Correspondence to the Board, received by the Secretary of the Board will be considered as part of the established School Board agenda if received by close of business on the Friday before the regularly scheduled Board meeting. If, however, in the judgment of the President of the Board, or any other Board member, the correspondence received in an untimely manner requires immediate action of the Board, he/she shall bring that correspondence to the Board's attention at the next regularly scheduled public meeting.

Public Comment at Meetings

In order to promote public discourse of issues that concern the District community, at every regular monthly business meeting of the Board, the Board shall provide at least two (2) opportunities for comments or questions from the public. The public comment periods are reserved for District residents and taxpayers to the District.—Additionally, the Board will accept comments from sitting public officials for non-campaigning purposes. At every standing committee meeting of the Board open to the public, the committee shall provide a reasonable opportunity for comments from the public regarding the subject of the meeting. The Board reserves the right to eject any unruly or obstreperous individuals from public meetings. The presiding officer or solicitor may:

- 1) interrupt or terminate a participant's statement when the statement exceeds time limits established by the Board, or is:
 - a. personally directed,
 - b. abusive,
 - c. obscene, or
 - d. irrelevant,
- 2) request any individual to leave the meeting when that person does not observe reasonable decorum,

- 3) request the assistance of law enforcement officers to remove a disorderly person when his/her conduct interferes with the orderly progress of the meeting, or
- 4) call a recess or adjourn to another time when the lack of public decorum interferes with the orderly conduct of the meeting.

Conflict of Interest <u>and Disclosure of Confidential Information – Prohibition</u> (Tredyffrin/Easttown School District Employees)

Definitions

"Immediate family" is defined herein as parent, spouse, child, brother or sister or anyone else who resides in the employee's household.

"Associated" as used below in connection with a business means a District employee or a member of the employee's immediate family who is an officer, director, owner or employee of or has a material financial interest in the business.

"Confidential Information" means information not obtainable from reviewing a public document or from making inquiry to a publicly available source of information.

Prohibition of Conflict of Interest

No District employee shall engage in conduct that constitutes a conflict of interest. A conflict of interest or potential conflict of interest exists in the event of:

A<u>a</u>ny transaction or arrangement in which a District representative<u>employee</u> uses any confidential information (information not attainable from reviewing a public document or from making inquiry to a publicly available source of information) obtained by virtue of his/her office or employment, for the private pecuniary benefit of the District representative<u>employee</u>, a member of his/her immediate family, or any business in which the District representative<u>employee</u> or a member of his/her immediate family is a director, officer, owner, employee or other material financial interest.

A conflict of interest does not include an action having a *de minimis* economic impact or which affects to the same degree a class consisting of an industry, occupation or other group which includes the District employee, a member of his/her immediate family or a business with which the District employee or a member of the District employee's immediate family is associated. Prohibition of Conflict of Interest and Disclosure of Confidential Information for Private Benefit

No District employee may use any confidential information obtained by virtue of his/her office or employment, for the private pecuniary benefit of the District employee, a member of his/her immediate family, or any business in which the District employee or a member of his/her immediate family is a director, officer, owner, employee or other material financial interest.

Prohibition of Conflict of Interest in Contracting with the District

Any transaction or arrangement between the District and any entity or individual in which or with which a District representative or a member of his/her immediate family is an officer or director or has a material financial interest; and/or,

(1) Any other transaction or arrangement in which a District representative or a member of his/her immediate family has a material financial interest.

"Immediate family" is defined herein as parent, spouse, child, brother or sister.

A conflict of interest does not include an action having a *de minimis* economic impact or which affects to the same degree a class consisting of an industry, occupation or other group which includes the District representative, a member of his/her immediate family or a business with which the District representative or a member of the District representative's immediate family is associated.

A District representative employee or a member of his/her immediate family or any business in which the District representative employee or a member of his/her immediate family is associated, may not enter into a contract valued at more than \$500 with the District, unless the contract has been awarded through an open and public process.

Extent of Prohibition

This policy is not intended to prohibit any action having a *de minimis* economic impact or which affects to the same degree a class consisting of an industry, occupation or other group which includes the District employee, a member of his/her immediate family or a business with which the District employee or a member of the District employee's immediate family is associated.

This Policy is intended to supplement, but not replace, any applicable state laws and regulations governing conflicts of interest, including, but not limited to, relevant provisions of the Pennsylvania Public School Code and the Pennsylvania Public Official and Employees Ethics Law.
