

1.) Choose a Topic:  The topic should be new to you. Remember - PAL is not an opporte to exhibit what you already know; it's a chance to learn something on your own!	<u> </u>
2.) Get an Overview of the Topic:  Get some background information and start to develop a list of keywords for further searching.	O Date Completed
3.) Develop a Driving Question: This is the question that will take you beyond just gathering informations are the properties. This question will help you build a new understanding of some aspect of your topic.	
4.) Create Questions to Guide Research:  These are the questions that you will use to gather information.	O Date Completed
5.) Start Collecting Information Sources: You need a minimum of 3 sources. You must have at least one book.	O Date Completed
6.) Take Notes and Create Your List of Sources  The best way to get your information into your own words is to take notes that focus on your keywords. Make bulleted lists or use the answer lines under your info gathering questions. Make your sourc as you go, following the directions in your PAL folder.	
7.) Organize Information and Answer Your Driving Question. How will you present your factsa chart, a graph, captions? What you DO with your facts? Example: You gathered information about dogs for the blind. Your driving question was "How are dogs chosen to work with blind people? You may choose to use the information you found to create a for your own pet, to determine whether he or she would have be chosen!	g ?" "test"
8.) Create and Present The Final Product:  Important - not every fact you collected needs to be on a presentat board. You might not even use a board. Your final product can take many different forms. Don't forget that YOU are the most important of your presentation. You will be there to explain to your audience you chose your topic, what you learned, and what you understand you didn't understand before.	e t part why
